All these events are open to any Masters, and one only needs to request an additional FIS license to participate in the international events. Contact the USSS office in Park city to get one. It will be worth it!

A few rule changes for 2024

I'd like to point out a few rule changes that have been added to the **2024 Alpine Competition Guide**.

If you stop during your run in DH, SG, or GS, you
may not continue through the rest of the course.
Your time will be stopped and it is dangerous for
you and the course workers if you go on. Generally,
the same applies if a ski comes off.

There is no "hiking" allowed for a missed gate in Giant Slalom, Super G, and Downhill races.

In Slalom, however, one may hike for a missed gate, but one must be aware of any oncoming racer and not interfere with that person's run. If overtaken, you are done. No continuing on! This slalom rule regarding hiking is an American rule and **not** valid in International races. No hiking in **any** of their events.

And yes, we allow a second run for our Masters races if they DQ or DNF in their first run of SL or GS, if conditions allow.

- If you anticipate forerunning any junior races, It is required that you take a "Safesport" course on line, and a background screening. This will give you a USSS license "with requirements," which all coaches and officials have. This is now mandatory.
- 3. Should you cross the finish line if you Know you've missed a gate or otherwise DQ'd?

No! It is very likely the timer has already stopped your time and you may interfere with the next racer's time. There should be a way to exit the course - usually near the finish.

An exception would be if you missed one of the last few gates and it would be unsafe For you to try to pull off the course.

There are many rules in ski racing.

As in all sports, It is the responsibility of the participant to know these rules.

Membership renewal

We are once again using Admin Ski Racing (ASR) for membership and race fees. Far West Masters membership for 2022-2023 is now open at masters. Admin Ski Racing. com/farwest. Activate your account for the season and pay your Far West Masters dues online.

This was a new process for us last season, and there were some challenges. Deb Lewis has been working closely with the ASR team and we hope many of the issues have been resolved. Don't forget, your Far West Masters membership is **in addition** to your US Ski & Snowboard Alpine Master membership. Your FWM membership dues supports organizing our division race calendar and provides you with a permanent race bib for all our Far West masters races.

Far West Masters membership is not required for firsttime racers or competitors from other divisions. Mary Feddis, our Membership Director, will contact you with additional information after you sign up for a race.

Palisades & Northstar parking update

As of December 31, 2023, advance parking is not required for any of our races. Palisades and Northstar are not requiring or offering parking reservations on Fridays or in April.

Our races on Friday, March 8 (Alpine), Friday, March 15 (Northstar), and Friday and Saturday, April 5-6 (Palisades) **do not require reservations at this time**.

Coach's corner: Pierre Jeangirard Mammoth Mountain Masters

Before going into the technical aspect of making a turn (a topic for a future newsletter), I like to make sure everyone understands how a ski works and what part of the ski you have to focus on:

- tip at the top of the turns
- middle of the ski at the maximum pressure
- apex, at the gate or slightly above the gate
- the tail of the ski below the gate

So, all this has to do with angles and pressure.

The ski won't bend unless it is on edge. So, first thing as you move forward (another subject!) in your transitions, you need to roll the skis on edge from the ankles and knees (starting from the ankles, inside your boots). That will activate your ankles and give you more stability doing so (toes to the nose).

As we progress through the season, we take this understanding of how the ski works and apply it as we work on the next steps in edging and creating your arc. I'll continue to build on this in future newsletters.

Coach's corner: Mark Mirviss Palisades Tahoe Masters

As we begin this season, without much snow, and limited training venues, despair not! This paucity of gate training, gives rise to technique improvement through directed free skiing and drills. We have now had six days of training on brush/stubbie gates, and EVERYONE improved over last season's end (I looked at last year's videos).

So, while training might not be as "fun" as if we were training in tall gate gates, it is at least, and probably more beneficial for most, at this point in the season! So, go forth, enjoy and improve! It's about concentration, and concentrated effort. One athlete (full disclosure, who lives with me) after proofreading this missive, told me she probably made gains in the last two weeks, that she may not have made in a season!

Coach's corner: Ryan Ritchie Diamond Peak Masters

The Diamond Peak Masters program is off to a great start for the '23-24 season! The staff at DP has done an exceptional job preparing our hill given the limited snowfall. The snowmaking team in particular blew enough snow for a spectacular surface and great coverage at this point in the year.

We've seen great early season participation in the Far West Masters Scholarship Program, where we are sponsoring a really great group of kids pursuing their ski racing dreams. Don't forget to send your year-end donations to Eddie.

Our Masters team at DP has grown once again this year, so we should see some new racers for FWM events especially in March when we host our two-day slalom series.

On hill, we have been doing as many "creative" (ie weird) drills as possible to challenge our neuromuscular systems in new ways to create new movement patterns. We focus on:

- balance (1,000 step turns, can you skate well? can you one ski?)
- body position (javelin turns, R-squareds, switchies)
- edge control (pivot turns, short swishies)

If you don't know what any of those are, you'll have to ask Coach Chris or Coach Ryan next time you see us. We're seeing fantastic improvements in new and veteran racers alike - now we just need a little more snow so we can transition into gates!

Coach's corner: Ray Tulloch Mt. Rose Masters

A look Behind the scenes!

While my fellow coaches have been sharing practical tips - warm ups, stretching etc. - I thought I would provide our members some insight in to what happens behind the scenes to actually deliver a training/race program. While a lot of this may appear to athletes to be seamless and "just happen" there is a huge amount of work that takes place behind the scenes to bring this to fruition.

As Ski Team Head Coach at Mt. Rose the Masters program is just one part of my race program responsibilities which also includes U12, U14, U16, FIS, Free Ride and Tahoe Race Series program. So, like most businesses, there are a lot of moving parts to sync up and actions to take to ensure effective program delivery.

Planning for the next season actually starts around February of the previous season when we review a number of data points including athlete numbers; what has been working; what needs to be improved; athlete and parent feedback; actual v. budget results to date; etc. We can then consider what, if any, additional programs or program expansions should be offered; any programs that should be discontinued due to lack of demand; projected athlete numbers; coaching resources; estimated budgetary costs; training hill space requirements etc. Based on this review proposals can then be discussed with Ski Area Management to agree program parameters, scope, costs and targets. Typically this will take place during March to enable the following season program options to be communicated to athletes and parents before the end of the season and discount opportunities to be offered to encourage early sign-ups, typically before the end of April, and to also sync up with discounted Season pass sales. As an example for season 23-24 we added a Saturday expansion option to our Masters program based on discussions with, and suggestions from, our athletes.

Early sign-ups provide critical feedback on whether further modifications to our product offerings may be necessary to match demand. During March/April as the end of the season approaches we do a true up of actual program costs v. revenues to identify whether next season pricing and budgets require further refinement to ensure viability.

Then, after a short end of season break, the logistical and resource challenges begin:

- How many coaches do we need to support all the programs?
- How can we coordinate hill and lane space to ensure all programs get sufficient training time while minimizing closures that impact pass-holders?
- What are possible mountain opening dates?
- How many additional/replacement coaches do we need to recruit?
- What do the race schedules look like for the different programs? What level of travel coaching support is required for each program? How will this impact training program support?
- What races will we be hosting at the mountain and how many race crew will be required?
- Coach training and certification requirements

For part-time programs, ensuring adequate coaching resources can be particularly challenging, especially to support any mid-week training requirements.

Recruitment and outreach to coach candidates becomes a major focus during September/October. In parallel with this we are also working on athlete recruitment and parent/athlete outreach and communication.

Moving into October the tempo increases further as we consider possible program start dates; coach onboarding and training; equipment advice and sourcing for athletes; race equipment inventory and condition (e.g. gates, timing equipment); travel plans and hotel bookings.....and praying for snow - or at least cold weather to allow snow-making!

Then November rolls around and, no matter how well we may have planned (to paraphrase Mike Tyson - "everyone has a plan until they get punched on the nose"), season opening hits us and there is a scramble to get communications out, finalize and stagger program start dates; get coaches on snow training; and most importantly, get athletes on snow to prepare for early season races. From there on, it is heads down and full speed ahead with training, travel communications, on the fly weather-driven adjustments etc. until the cycle repeats!

And you thought it was just about skiing and providing training and feedback...

Scholarship Program: In the beginning

The Far West Masters scholarship program has been providing funding to student racers for close to 35 years. Bob Bernard (of the Bernard Cup) worked with USSA to include Masters in the early 80's. At the start, Bob was the director for all of the Masters divisions, and started the initial fundraising program for Masters to give to USSA programs. He started with a program to provide edited videotapes of the best World Cup runs to USSA to give to the kids programs to learn to be better racers. However, Bob quickly realized that the Far West division was raising most of the money, and about 20% was going to production costs for the videos. Eddie Mozen suggested it would be best to give all of the funds directly to the kids instead of paying those production costs. This way, all the money raised went directly to the kids. The program continues to donate 100% of funds raised to the student racers.

In the first couple years of the program, about 8-9 kids were accepted. Today, about 35-40 kids are accepted out of about 70 applicants each year. Far West Masters raises the money, and the fiscal year runs from November 1 - October 31. This way, the program volunteers know exactly how much money they have to give each year and will accept as many students as they can with the funding on hand. Any funds raised starting November 1 will be applied toward the following year's scholarship recipients.

In the next newsletter, we'll write about the application and selection process.

Past scholarship recipient update: Morganne Murphy

My name is Morganne Murphy and I am currently an emergency medicine resident physician at Riverside Community Hospital.

- Fluoro race waxes are NOT ALLOWED in any US events (ban instituted in 2021)


Race day profiles
